Everyone is welcome to join us.


THE CABLE GUY WAS HERE

THE BOOGIE WOOGIE BUGLE BOY MAY HAVE DANCED HERE!

Palais Royale. The name of this classic ballroom evokes visions of dancing to romantic music in a beautiful setting. Opened in 1922 to coincide with the launch of the Sunnyside Amusement Park, it became Toronto's hot spot where big bands, including Duke Ellington, Count Basie, Benny

odman and the Dorsey Brothers jammed. In the 1930's crowds of 1000 danced six nights a week and enjoyed an admission fee of ten cents, plus five cents a dance. The strongest drinks available were coke and ginger ale.

Sunnyside Amusement Park was demolished in 1955 to make way for the Gardiner Expressway and an expanded Lakeshore Blvd. The popularity of Palais Royale slowly declined, and the building deteriorated.

The City of Toronto declared it an historic site in 1974. However, it was not until the city negotiated a long-term lease with Pegausus Group in 2005, that restoration of the building was begun, and when it was completed, surpassed its original splendor.

The Palais Royale re-opened its doors in June 2007 and today is alive with dances, concerts, dinners and private events. It is located on 1601 Lakeshore Blvd. 416-533-3553.





VILLAGE PLAYERS BROADWAY IN BLOOR WEST VILLAGE



Back in 1974, a handful of very talented people who had an interest in theatre, decided to stage a live play. Their first home was the Wedgewood Restaurant at Jane and Bloor. They had such a great response that they decided to produce another play, and another and another. and as they say, the rest is history.

The Village Players, a nonprofit community theatre became a reality. The only person that gets paid is the cleaner. They finally found a great location at 2190 Bloor St. West (just east of Runnymede) and with a lot of volunteers and a few gallons of paint and a lot of hard work

transformed the premises to an acceptable theatre.

The Village Players have produced such great plays as Arsenic and Old Lace and Sweeny Todd. These are the only 2 plays that were repeated for their 25th anniversary. I have always been impressed by the talent that their volunteers bring forth and in may cases, set the stage, act in the play, produce it or direct it. Earlier this year they held a silent auction which raised \$2,500. This will help to pay their rent.

After a great response from area residents last reason Solar Stage Children Theatre (SSCT) came back this season. There are 2 shows left: "Sing and Dance" with Jack Grunsky in April and "Rapunzel" at the end of May. Join in at the last Thursday of every Performance for "Talk Back Thursday". The questions are endless.
