# PROPERTY MANAGER'S REPORT



#### Let's Get Serious About Recycling

The City of Toronto was forced to take aggressive measures to reduce the amount of waste going to the landfill. They plan to increase diversion from 13% to 70% by 2010. To achieve 70% diversion, the city's plan requires full participation from single family homes and multi-residential buildings to keep the volume of waste below 25 litres per household per week. The plan proposes to give taxpayers a financial incentive to reduce the amount of waste they send to the landfill. The City of Toronto has added new items, which are now recyclable. You can now recycle plastic grocery and retail bags without drawstrings, metal detailing or hard plastic handles. Place all plastic bags in one grocery bag or retail bag and tie handles together. You can also recycle foam polystyrene. This includes foam protective packaging from meat trays, foam takeout containers, foam plates, foam egg cartons and foam coffee cups.

All food residues must be removed and items prewashed

Energy-saving fluorescent tubes and compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs) contain small amounts of mercury, a poisonous heavy metal, which is used to produce light. Please contact the office for safe disposal.

The challenge for condominiums will be to minimize the amount of solid waste set out for collection. City staff will visit building- by-building to provide information brochures and kitchen containers, for all residents, free of charge. It is to be assumed that when the organic waste diversion program starts it will be easier to reach their targets.

# 生け花

Ikebana is the Japanese art of flower arrangement, and is also known as kado (the "way of flowers"). It has been practised for around 600 years.



As a disciplined art form, it transcends simply putting flowers in a container. Ikebana often emphasizes other areas of the plant, such as its stems and leaves. Shape, line and form are key considerations. Though Ikebana is a creative expression, it has certain rules that govern its form.

The main rule is that all the elements used in construction must be organic – branches, leaves, grasses or flowers.

Ikebana is distinguished by its use of minimalism. That is, an arrangement may consist of only a minimal number of blooms interspersed among the stalks and leaves. The container is also a key element of the composition, and various styles of pottery may be used in their construction. Ikebana uses asymmetrical form and empty space as an essential feature of the arrangement.

The *Moribana* (upright style) is considered the most basic structure in Ikebana.

#### Ikebana continued

Moribana literally means "piled-up flowers" which are arranged in a shallow

container. Moribana is secured on kenzan or needle point holders, also know as metal frogs.

The creations in the low vase that you have seen recently are a novice's attempts at Moribana to bring harmony to our lobby lounge.

# PREPARE FOR EMERGENCY SITUATIONS



When the power goes off:

1. flashlights, cell phone, battery powered radio. Extra batteries on hand for the radio and flashlight.

Flashlights should be located where you spend most


of your time. Avoid groping around in the dark. Portable radio tuned to "all news" station (680) on the dial.

- 2. Avoid excessive opening and closing of the refrigerator. Food in the frozen section can remain frozen for hours.
- 3. Toilets will operate for at least one flush.
- 4. Have large containers of water available for use and bottled water.
- 5. Only 1 elevator will be in use.
- 6. Hallways and stairwells will be lit.
- 7. Cordless telephones will not work.
- 8. Telephone landlines should be working.
- 9. Unless absolutely necessary avoid calling superintendent/office, as our staff will already be busy.
- 10. When required to leave your unit, take:
  - a. Identification, passport, health card, driver's license, cash/credit cards, eyewear, medications and pets, keys etc.
  - b. Close, lock doors and windows.

#### VILLAGE SIDEWALKS

#### THE OLD MILL

In 1843, Thomas Fisher from Leeds, England built a mill on the banks of the Humber River, and shortly after sold it to William Gamble. In 1837 Gamble hired William Tyrrell to construct a larger mill. A fire in 1849 destroyed the mill, which was replaced by a new larger mill. The stone for the mill came from the Humber Valley as did the lumber and beams which were hewn on the site. Limestone was brought in from Kingston to the mouth of the Humber and then to the site on barges. One cold night

night in 1881 a small fire was lit in the upper mill to prevent stored apples from freezing. The mill burned down leaving only the heavy stonewalls which still stand in the Old Mill Tea Garden, a quaint monument to the Humber pioneers of the past. In the early 19<sup>th</sup> century there was a busy little community clustered around the Old Mill on the Humber, which the settlers called, "The Garden of Eden". The Old Mill still retains its old world charm. Today many enjoy the restaurant, bar, patio, spa and the chapel where many weddings are held. It still serves one of the best English High Teas in Toronto. For more information or samples of their menus just go to their website.
